# "The Tizard Mission - The Top-Secret Operation that Changed the Course of World War II"

This book was published in December 2010 and might be of some interest to those Syracuse Elfuns who worked the radar side of the house. It is available in hardcover from Amazon.com for \$18.48 (Kindle edition \$15.40).

During the 1930's the British had been actively pursuing the development of radar and by the end of the decade had determined that to meet operational requirements, they needed a radar that operated in the 10cm band with a pulsed power of multi-kilowatts. Klystron tubes could operate at this frequency but could not produce the required power. The British had produced samples of a device called a cavity magnetron which could provide both the frequency and the power, but they lacked the production capability. This book relates

how Sir Henry Tizard visited the United States and induced a number of companies, including General Electric, to produce magnetrons in large quantities.

Of more interest to Syracuse are the chapters in the book that describe the establishment Radiation of the Laboratory at MIT and the development of the SCR-584 conical scan Fire Control Radar. This radar was truly state of the art and large quantities were needed. An initial production order of 1,600 was followed by additional orders and over 6,000 of these radars were produced by several firms before the end of the war. In Syracuse, General Electric took over an abandoned trolley car repair shop on Wolf Street and converted it to production of the SCR-584 radars.
