
Syracuse Elfun Society 2022 Summer Newsletter

Throughout the 2021-2022 fiscal year, the Syracuse Elfun Society carefully traversed the new 'normal'. Elfuns enjoyed each other's company at the Family Day at the Ballpark, Rev Theater and Holiday



Luncheon. Last year we held our Annual Meeting on Zoom. This year we were able to meet in in person at Coleman's on Wednesday June 8, 2022.

The Following is a summary of what was covered at the Annual Meeting:

We currently have **212** paid members on our roster. We began fiscal year 2021-2022 with \$5,800 in our treasury. Dues payments and interest were our major sources of income. GE's "Comic Books"

There are many things we associate with General Electric: Jet Engines, TVs, Refrigerators and Dishwashers, Radar and Sonar Systems, Hair Dryers and even Electrical power meters. But Comic Books? Not so much.

Starting in 1945, and continuing through at least 1961, GE published a series of short booklets that highlighted the technology used in many of the products that GE produced. Because each booklet was limited to 16 pages, was printed in a 7.5" x 10" format and used a series of cartoon-like drawings, they were referred to as "Comic Books." A sample page from one of the books is shown on page 4.

A partial list of the "books" is as follows:

Most of the books tell a story from the viewpoint of Johnny Powers, a teenager, and his older brother "Ed" who seems to know everything about the technology covered in that particular comic book, and who also has the contacts within GE so that he and Johnny can tour the various facilities.

As an example, the 1950 "Adventures in Electricity – Television" book, starts out with Ed taking Johnny through the studios of WRGB television in Schenectady. WRGB just happens to be GE's pioneering TV station named after Dr. Walter R. G. Baker. Later pages take Johnny through the buildings at Electronics Park where televisions were designed and produced.

The 1959 "Our Place In Space" has Johnny learning about space satellites and the rockets that launch them into space. As the story progresses it touches on the technology being developed at GE's: Heavy Military Electronics & Defense Systems in Syracuse; Ordnance Department in Pittsfield; Light Military Electronics Department in Utica; Receiving Tube Department in Owensboro, KY; Aircraft Turbine Department in Lynn, MA; Missile & Space Vehicle Department in Philadelphia and the Flight Propulsion Laboratory in Evendale, OH.

The comic books were printed on inexpensive, highacid paper and have not withstood the test of time well. The formerly white paper has aged to a brown





Reader Feedback

Responding to several **GE comic books** I sent him during the process of writing an article about them that appears on the previous pages: "Steve thanks for the GE "Comic Books". I have been trying to find the one I had but some how put it in a crate and can not find it. As I recall, it was meant to encourage students to think about careers in Engineering and hopefully GE. We distributed them to the schools to pass out. In fact, one summer we had the Guidance Counselor from Central Tech working in Human Resources so he could learn about the jobs we had and the qualifications. He could then better explain our careers to students and encourage then to pursue technical careers. This had to be in the 1968-69 time frame when I worked in Personnel at CSP#1. They were made just like a comic book. I don't remember seeing them after 1969." - John Davern

On The Wall Street Journal review of the book "The Man Who Broke Capitalism": "I just finished the book. Our son heard the author interviewed on NPR and bought me a copy. Quite an indictment on Jack and Welchism which kept the stock price rising

through layoffs, plant closing, outsourcing, stock buyback, cheaper labor, acquisitions, R&D reduction - anything to reduce costs and increase share value. And employees were a cost and NOT an asset. Turned management philosophy upside down from customers and employees first to shareholders first, at any cost.

The author gave Jack the credit for turning a lot of corporations to this new philosophy. People trained at and/or by GE became CEOs elsewhere and got a bump due to their pedigree, then, mostly, trashed the company. Boeing was one of the big names.

Isn't it interesting how we learn about this stuff after the fact, some of us way after the fact? When thinking about those Welch years, I was working, and my S&S was doing well. But there were those who didn't benefit and, I think, Syracuse seemed somewhat protected. Maybe it was Pag?

I'm old now and this stuff shouldn't bother me. I've done ok, good family, health not too bad. But it does bother me! But enough now, way more than enough." - Art Johnson

Can You Smell It?

First, some history. The Popsicle was invented in 1905, near San Francisco by 11-year-old Frank Epperson. Young Epperson had mixed soda powder and water with a wooden stirring stick and forgotten it outside overnight. It was an especially cold evening, and when Epperson went out the next morning, he found his drink had frozen solid around the stirring stick. Rather than waste it, he decided to simply lick the frozen drink off the stick. He called his accidental discovery an Epsicle ice pop and made more to sell around his neighborhood.

Epperson's children began calling his invention a "Popsicle," creating the famous brand name still known today.

Today, the Popsicle brand is a household name and continues to sell billions of frozen treats every year.

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In its never-ending search for perfection, the US Postal Service decided to honor the Popsicle by issuing a special "Scratch-and-Sniff" stamp to honor the Popsicle. On June 20, 2018, the USPS issued America's first scratch-and-sniff stamps. Scratch-and-sniff technology actually dates back to the 1960s. At the time, researchers at 3M and NCR Corporation sought improved ways to hold ink in tiny pockets on paper for use in carbon copies and register receipts.

The process they developed was known as "microencapsulation" and it was soon discovered

that it could contain scented oils. When put under pressure, by a scratch for instance, they would release small particles of the scented oil. Scratch-and-sniff was soon popular in children's books and in the marketing of toiletries, and became especially widespread in the 1980s.

The Syracuse Elfun Society has managed to obtain a few of the Scratch-and-Sniff stamps and if you receive this newsletter through the USPS, the envelope will use one of these stamps for part of the postage. See whether Scratch-and-Sniff stamps have withstood the test of time during the 4 years since they were printed. *Enjoy the aroma. Do not try to eat the stamp. Have A Happy Summer!*
